There is no cost for the evening other than the dish to share. This evening is to support the organization of a Pipe and Drum Corp at Benedictine High School. Benedictine already has a "Drum Corp" and they along with 7 cadet pipers are working with Tim and the St. Andrew's Legion Pipe to organize the corp.

Besides the fun of having dinner with your Celtic friends - the movie "Walk For Wallace" will be shown. William Wallace - the legendary 'Braveheart'- was murdered at the butcher yards of Smithfield in London, and this DVD is a tribute to Wallace, on the 700th anniversary of his death.

In the movie, the late David Ross, Scottish author and historian and conveyor of the Wallace Society, walks in the footsteps of William Wallace along the same lonely path to London city, where Scotland's hero was hung, drawn and quartered to the amusement of a mass English crowd. This story is not a historical record but a tribute to the spirit of Wallace by his supporters from around the world - It is inspired by David Ross and his followers, who carry Wallace's coffin home to Scotland where his spirit is finally laid to rest.

An Irish Christmas

Christmas whitewashing: Around Christmastime, you'll still find the odd farm building out in the Irish countryside that looks like it's just been whitewashed. Long ago, farm families cleaned and then whitewashed every building on the farm in December. They were covered in white paint or limewash, to symbolically purify them for the coming of the savior. The tradition traces back thousands of years, not just through Celtic culture, but through other Central European cultures as well.

Before Christmas trees: Having an evergreen-type Christmas tree is a relatively new phenomenon in Ireland. Years ago, whole families went out to find holly bushes and ivy to decorate the mantelpiece and other parts of the house. Finding a holly bush with lots of berries was considered a harbinger of good luck in the coming year. Holly was also used because it allowed poor people to decorate their homes in the same way as those who were better off. The bush was so common in Ireland in winter there was plenty for everyone.

• Ancient Celts believed that mistletoe had tremendous healing powers – (I know it's fun to collect the kisses!). Christians saw it as such a strong symbol of paganism, in fact, that they banned it until the so-called "revival of Christmas" in the Victorian era.

January 6th, is a traditional day for Irish women to leave their housework behind and go out with each other to have fun. It's a very old holiday, kept alive today by a few enthusiastic Irish ladies.

• It is considered **bad luck to take down holiday decorations** before "Little Women's
Christmas" (sometimes simply called "Little
Christmas") on January 8th.

• Welcoming Candle: A Christmas candle in the window, still popular not just in Ireland but here in the US, was long displayed as a symbol of hospitality.

Window candles in Ireland were a symbol that the homeowner would welcome the Holy Family – unlike the innkeeper in Bethlehem who bore the guilt of having turned them away. During times of intolerance for Catholicism in Ireland, window candles also were meant to announce that it was safe to say mass in a home.

• leaving a mince pie and a bottle of Guinness out on Christmas Eve was once popular in Ireland. It was meant to be a snack for Santa Claus.
